## Hudson Robotics Competition

Hudson High School's official robotics team, Weapons of Mass Construction (WoMC), took a trip to RPI in Rensselaer. They competed in the FIRST Robotics Competition this weekend. The objective of the game is to get a ball into goals located in towers. There were defenses placed on the map and getting over them would result in points. They played in the qualifying matches, but only got 18th place. After the qualifying matches, the top eight teams could pick two other teams to form an alliance. Hudson was not picked, but they were chosen as a substitute if any robot was unable to compete. The robot of Team 48 broke down and Hudson was immediately put in. They played defensively and played crucial roles in helping the team win. They went past the quarterfinals and the semifinals and moved on to the finals. Two rounds were played with a win for each team. It went into a tie

breaker and the opposing team took home the gold. The opposing team consisted of Team 359, Team 3990, and Team 4481. After the final game, awards were given out and Team 1665 (Hudson), Team 20, and Team 5254 received silver medals. At the end of the ceremony it was announced that two wild cards were going to be put in play. These wild cards would enable the selected teams to go to the World Championships. Team 5254 and Team 1665 were selected and they were going to the World Championship in St. Louis, Missouri. WoMc also took a five hour drive to Rochester to compete in the FIRST Finger Lakes Regional Robotics Competition. The team played hard, but thanks to malfunctions and problems with the robot, they only

placed 32nd. Alliances were chosen after, but WoMC was not picked. The quarterfinals, semifinals, and finals were played with Team 20, Team 639, and Team 1405 coming out on top. Wild cards were also put into play with Team 3940 and 3044 winning them. They will be joining Team 1665 in the World Championships. Stay tuned for more on this great opportunity! Hopefully Hudson will get the funds needed to compete in St. Louis! The Robotics' Team is very hopeful.

## Prison Public Memory Project

The Prison Public Memory Project comes to Hudson High! The project, led by Brian Buckley, in collaboration with Mrs. Wheeler, seeks to recover, preserve, and interpret the stories of those who served time in historical prisons across the United States. Brian is Hudson site coordinator, and has been researching Hudson's Prison history. During the weekly meetings with Hudson students, Brian explained how the current Hudson Correctional Facility was originally the New York State Training School for Girls, and before that the House Refuge for Women. At the meetings students were able to access copies of letters, physician's reports, and newspaper articles from the

prison's archives. Activities such as oral history lessons, and case studies have been led by Brian every week. Currently, Hudson students are working on creating zines (a small self published work involving text and/or photography) about Hudson's prison history. The group will exhibit their work at the Hudson Opera House, beginning with a reception on May 27th.

bies are often too fragile to hold, so their family reads to them instead. The books donated goes to Albany Medical Center, St. Peter's Hospital, Stony Brook Hospital, Crouse Hospital, Golisano Children's Hospital, UHS Wilson Medical Center, Bellevue Women's Center, and the Special Care Unit at Glens Falls Hospital. This year, there were over 127 sites. Hudson's Honor Society was able to donate 68 books towards bookraiser. There was a total of 14, 842 books collected overall for Project: Cameron's Story.
